2022 SHOW CHARITY

Leicestershire and Rutland REMAP Custom Made Equipment for People with Disabilities

REMAP is a national registered charity which has been supplying one-off technical aids to disabled people for over 55 years. Every aid is designed and produced specifically to the client's needs and is given free of charge. The devices they make can help people become more mobile, give them greater independence or enable them to take part in a favourite hobby or pastime. They get a lot of their work through the NHS or Social Services but anyone can ask for their help including the person with the disability, their family, friends or carers.

The charity operates through a network of over 900 volunteers who belong to 80 panels, located throughout the UK. Their members are engineers, technicians, craftspeople and community and medical professionals, who between them design and produce equipment to solve a wide range of problems.

Each year the charity makes the equivalent of £2 million worth of equipment for people with disabilities. They are funded entirely through donations and are one of Britain's most cost-effective charities. It has been estimated that for every £100 they receive in donations, they are able to produce £2,000 worth of equipment. This is because their volunteers are very resourceful, often using components salvaged from things which would normally be thrown away, to make well-designed custom-made devices which enhance people's lives.

The Leicestershire and Rutland panel took on jobs ranging from a variety of wheelchair attachments, including child seats, mobile phone holders and specialized trays; to devices for eating, drinking and aiding mobility. Other recent devices include a modified wheelchair for a disabled bowlers club and many aids for members of the LOROS Motor Neuron Disease group.

The local panel consists of engineers, metalworkers, IT technicians, electricians, woodworkers and health professionals. 6. Exhibits, **where indicated**, to be staged in vases supplied by B.G.C.
7. No bottles to be used in staging.
8. **Exhibits must be staged by 12:00 noon. The room will then be cleared except for the Judges and officials.**
9. B.G.C. will provide competent judges and officials.
10. The Judges have the power to disqualify any entry which does not comply with the Schedule and to withhold prizes from exhibits not considered worthy.
11. Any objections raised must be made in writing and handed to the Show Manager with the fee of £1, non-returnable, not later than 5:00 p.m. on Show Day.
12. The decision of the Judges is final.
13. Points awarded for the Horticultural Sections; First - 3 points, Second - 2 points, Third - 1 point.
14. B.G.C. will not accept responsibility for loss or damage to exhibits.
15. All cups and trophies will be the responsibility of the holder whilst in his/her possession and should be returned to the show contacts before the following July.
16. The B.G.C Dahlia Championship will be judged to The National Dahlia Society Rules.
17. **Pre-entry Classes** - BGC Dahlia Championship and Classes 1 – 4 Floral Art Section. All other open classes may be entered on the day.

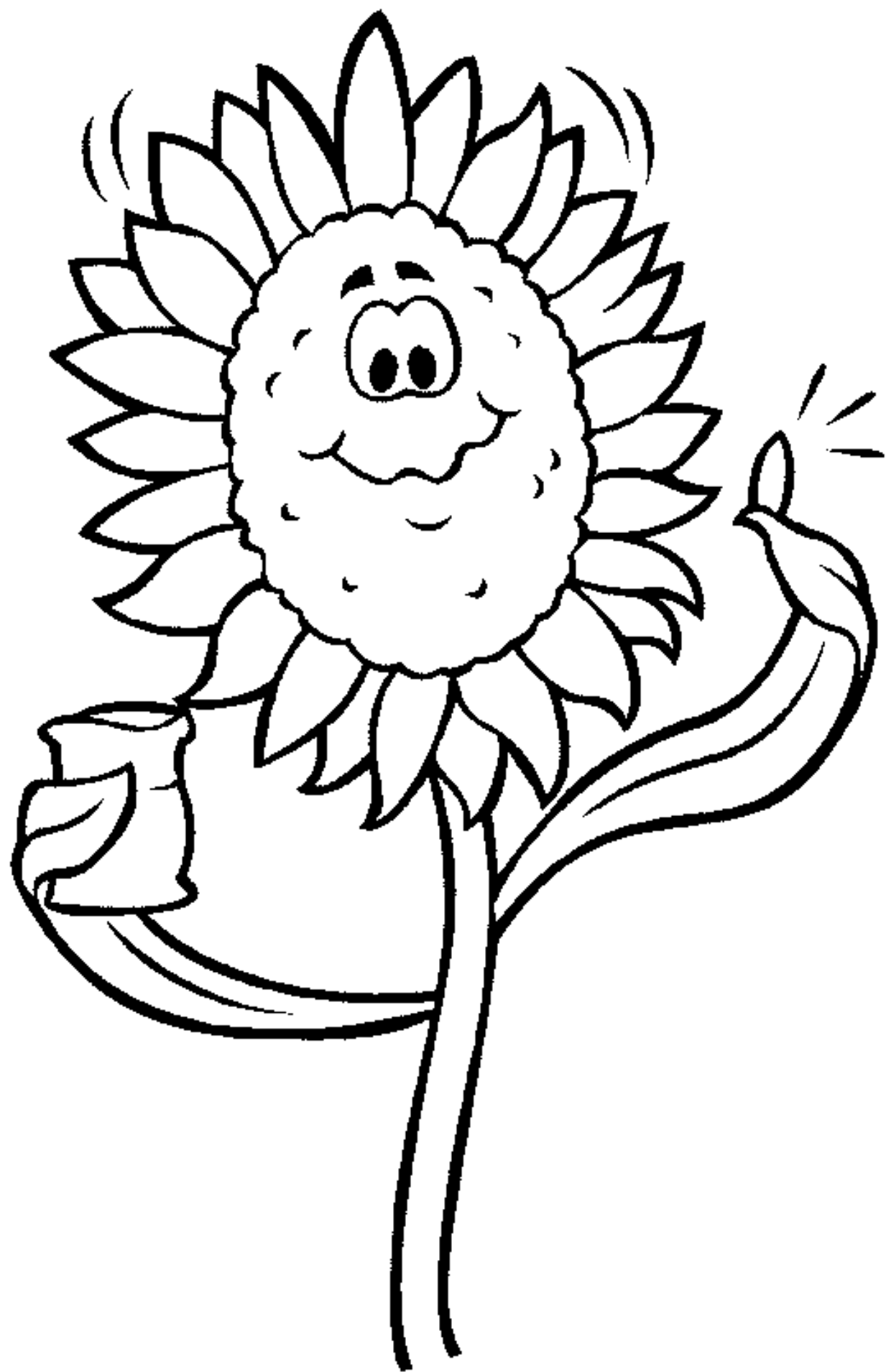

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Lemon Drizzle Cake - Makes a 450g cake

115g butter
175g self-raising flour
175g caster sugar
2 eggs
60ml (4tbs) milk
Rind and juice of 1 lemon
Icing sugar
Granulated sugar

1. Preheat the oven to Gas mark 4/350F/180C/. Grease and line a 450g loaf tin with greaseproof paper. Beat together butter, self-raising flour, caster sugar, eggs, milk and the lemon rind for 2 minutes. Spoon into loaf tin, make a well in the centre and bake for 1 hour until well risen and golden.
2. Loosen edges of cake from tin. Mix lemon juice and 45 ml (3tbsp) icing sugar together and spoon over the hot cake. Sprinkle with granulated sugar to give a crunchy topping.
3. Leave in tin until cold and then remove greaseproof paper.

Victoria Sandwich Cake

175g soft margarine
175g caster sugar
175g self-raising flour
3 eggs
2-3 tablespoons raspberry jam
2 tins 18cm diameter
Oven: Gas mark 4/350F/180C

Grease and lightly flour the tins. Cream the margarine and sugar until soft and fluffy. In a separate basin beat the eggs lightly and add to the creamed mixture beating thoroughly. Fold in the sieved flour carefully with a metal spoon. Place the mixture equally in the two tins. Bake for 25/30 minutes or until firm and golden brown. When cold, join the cakes together with the jam. Sprinkle the surface lightly with caster sugar.

Honey Cake

250g of clear honey plus 3 tbsp. to glaze
225g butter, cubed
110g dark muscovado sugar
3 large eggs beaten
300g self-raising flour

1. Preheat the oven to Gas mark 3/300F/150C
2. Grease and line a 20cm round, loose bottomed cake tin. Put the honey, butter and sugar into a saucepan. Stir over a low heat until melted then increase the heat and boil for 1 minute. Leave to cool for 15 – 20 minutes so that the eggs won't cook when they are added.
3. Beat the eggs into the honey mixture using a wooden spoon. Sift the flour into a large bowl and add the mixture, beating until it is smooth and runny.
4. Pour the mixture into the tin and bake for 50 minutes to 1 hour, until the cake is golden and springy and a knife comes out clean when pushed in. Turn the cake out onto a wire rack.
5. Warm the remaining honey in a small pan. Using a skewer, make a number of holes in the cake. Brush the honey over the cake to give a sticky glaze, with some of it seeping in, then leave to cool.

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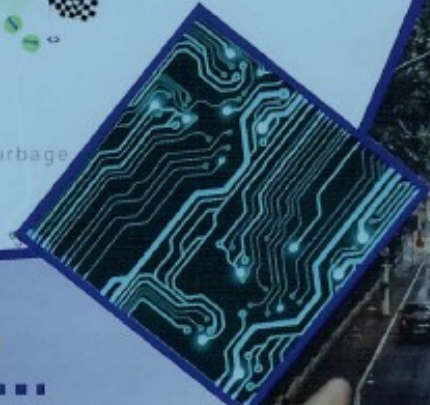
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Gingerbread Character

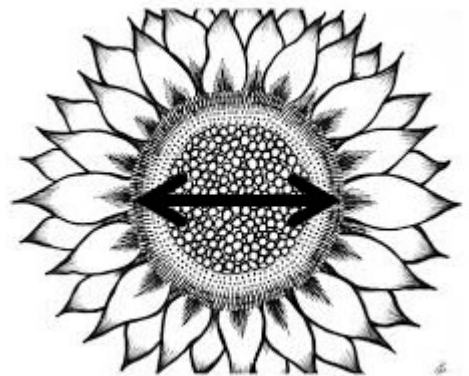
225g S.R. flour	3 tbsp milk
100g margarine or butter	1 level tsp mixed spice
75g soft brown sugar (light or dark)	2 level tsp ground ginger
Oven Gas mark 6/400F/200C	

Best cooked middle to top of oven on a greased baking tray.

1. Sieve flour and spices together into a mixing bowl. Add the margarine or butter cut into small pieces.
2. Rub the margarine or butter into the flour to resemble fine breadcrumbs.
3. Add the sugar and stir into the rubbed-in mixture.
4. Gradually add the milk, mixing to a stiff dough. IT MAY NOT TAKE ALL THE MILK TO DO THIS.
5. Lightly dust the table with flour and knead the dough.
6. Roll out to approximately 5mm thick and cut out shapes. Gather up trimmings and re-roll until dough is used up.
7. Prick the tops lightly with a fork and you can brush with a little milk if you prefer.
8. Bake for 15 minutes (this will vary with the size of shapes) until they are golden brown. Test by gently pressing the biscuits – they should be firm to the touch.
9. Allow to cool and decorate in your own style.

Sunflower – The Largest Seed Head

Although sunflowers can grow very tall the height of your sunflower is NOT important in this competition. We are only interested in the size of the seed head, not including the petals. Bring your flower head to the show which will be measured by our judges as shown in the diagram opposite:



THE B.G.C. VEGETABLE TRAY COMPETITION

The B.G.C. Vegetable Tray class is for a collection of 3 types of vegetables taken from the following list of twelve. The quantity of each vegetable required for the collection is given in brackets:

Carrots (2)	Peas (4 pods)
Cauliflowers (2)	Potatoes (2)
Onions (2)	Runner beans (3 pods)
Parsnips (2)	Tomatoes (4)
French beans (3)	Beetroot (2)
Cucumber (1)	
Courgettes (2)	

Each type of vegetable will be judged out of a total of 20 points. This is split into three sections as follows; 7 points for size, shape and colour; 7 points for condition; 6 points for uniformity. The overall mark will be out of a total of 60.

All vegetables are to be displayed for effect. The vegetables must be displayed within an area measuring 450mm x 600mm, without bending any part of them. No part of any exhibit may exceed the size of the tray. A tray or board measuring 450mm x 600mm can be used to display the vegetables or the area can simply be marked on the staging. Where a tray has a lip or edge, it is the internal measurements that must not exceed 450mm x 600mm.

A black cloth is permitted, and the tray may be painted. Parsley is allowed for garnishing but no other foliage or accessories, such as plates, sand, rings and so on, will be allowed. Onion tops may be tied or whipped using raffia or string.

RULES FOR B.G.C. VEGETABLE TRAY COMPETITION - EXHIBITORS AND JUDGES

1. Carrots and parsnips must have foliage trimmed back to 75mm.
2. Peas and beans must be displayed with some stalk attached.
3. Tomatoes must be displayed with calyces (the green flower bud case).
4. Judges may handle exhibits, open pods etc., to check for quality.
5. The tray, board or staging must not be cut or mutilated in any way at all, such as cutting holes for standing onions in.
6. Judges will use their discretion when judging the B.G.C. Vegetable Tray class, remembering that entries may come from fairly inexperienced exhibitors.
7. The points awarded should be clearly marked by the judges on the exhibitors' cards.
8. Any queries that may arise, regarding anything other than the above Rules, should be referred to, and decided by the Show Officials.

Failure to abide by any of these rules will lead to disqualification.

GUIDANCE FOR EXHIBITORS

The Show Schedule should be studied very carefully, and all of the regulations noted, in particular closing dates for entries, staging times and lifting times. It is essential that these are observed.

Entry Forms should be completed legibly. Entries for pre-booking Classes should be sent before the closing date. Be sure to allow plenty of time to stage the number of entries you are submitting. It is very important to stage the number of specimens the Schedule calls for; failure to do so can result in your exhibits being 'not according to Schedule' and therefore out of contention for a prize.

Be sure, where possible, to take extra specimens of each cultivar with you to the Show; accidents do happen and replacements are better to hand than nestling at home.

Always remember that exhibiting is in the main pleasurable; be a sportsman at all times. Most Shows have a Complaints procedure; only use it after very careful and serious consideration. Exhibiting is supposed to be a pleasure, be sure by your conduct that everyone, including yourself, enjoys this pleasurable pastime.

Where a trophy is won every effort should be made to attend the presentation at the end of the day. By the same token, the return date should be observed.

RULES OF EXHIBITING

VEGETABLES:

As grown

The term 'as grown' means no foliage should be removed, just the soil washed away.

Dressed

Roots are removed and the top of the onion or shallot is bound and trimmed to a neat finish.

Tomatoes, Truss

Truss with no fruits missing and free from any pest or disease damage. The truss should gradually reduce or taper down from good quality ripe edible fruits to a number of smaller immature unripe fruits. Single or double trusses are acceptable. The ideal truss would have at least one third of the fruit fully ripe and no uneven ripening, i.e. ripening out of order, along the truss.

PRESERVES:

Avoid using 'trade' jars and tops, coffee jars are not suitable. Ensure the jar is clean, has a label that states the main ingredients and the date made. Trade names on lids should be covered. All exhibits will be tasted.

Jams and Marmalade

Jars should always be filled to the brim; the product should have a good colour and consistency. A wax circle is only used if a film/parchment top is used. The wax circle must be applied to the hot preserve. Twist tops should also be placed onto the hot product to ensure a good seal. Tops should not be changed for judging – checking the seal is part of the judging process. Jams and Marmalades should be displayed in 450g jars only.

Chutney

Chutney should be at least 2 – 3 months old before showing. The main ingredients used in the chutney should be listed on the label together with the date made. Mustard pickles are not a chutney and cannot be judged as part of a chutney class. Chutney should be displayed in 450g jars only.

BAKED GOODS:

Always read the Schedule carefully for the number required of a product and/or tin size. Finished products should not have cooling rack marks visible. All cooking papers should be removed before showing. The use of cling film or a mesh cover will help to maintain standards of hygiene.

Victoria Sandwich

Evenly matched depth for each half. Sandwiched with raspberry jam. No additional filling e.g. cream. Light sprinkling of caster sugar on top is allowed. Delicate flavour.

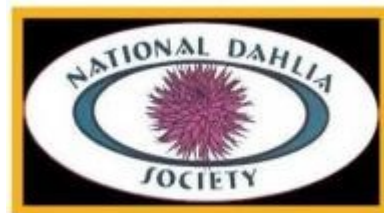
